GENERAL RULES

PREMIUM CHECKS WILL BE VOIDED 90 DAYS AFTER THEY ARE PRINTED

Barns open to public 8AM – 10PM Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and 11PM on Friday and Saturday.

Home and Garden Buildings open 10AM-10PM Tuesday - Saturday

EXHIBITS

1. All exhibitors agree to be bound by the rules and regulations of the Warren County Fair.
2. The Fair Management reserves the right to amend or add to these rules and regulations as its judgment may determine.
3. During fair week reasonable care will be taken to protect all exhibits on display from all injury and damage, but the Fair is not, in any way, to be held responsible for accidents, loss or damage by water, fire, theft, or otherwise, whatever may be the cause or extent of the damage or loss. Exhibits not removed during the stipulated removal time allotted by the Fair are the responsibility of the owner; the Fair cannot assure the wellbeing of the exhibits.
4. Entries will be made according to classifications as listed in Official Premium Book. Application for entry must be signed.
5. Premiums, as listed, may be given for meritorious exhibits. In cases where there is no competition, judges may give an award such as they deem the exhibit is worthy to receive. Same rules apply where there are fewer entries in any class than the number of premiums offered. The judges may, at their discretion, award a prize or prizes of such grade as the exhibit deserves. The fair reserves the right to determine how many entries they will accept from any exhibitor in the same class, or in the case of livestock, the same breed, and poultry, the same species. The decision of the judges shall be final in all cases except where mistakes, fraud misrepresentation or collusion, not discovered at the time of award, is proved. All protests regarding judging must be made in writing, and must plainly state the cause of the complaint or appeal. Such protest must be filed at the Fair Office within 24 hours of the occurrence. The case may be appealed to the Fair's Executive Board from whose decision there can be no appeal.
6. It shall be the responsibility of the exhibitor to make known the proper name of the article or breed

of livestock he is entering. Any item entered improperly will be disqualified to receive a prize, but the judges will mark the correct name on the entry tag for the benefit of the owner so the same mistake in entering need not be made the second time.

7. All entries must be grown, produced, or made in the county since the last fair. (Except where the fair accepts exhibits from other counties or states.)

8. Superintendents of a department reserve the right of refusing to accept any entry. Furthermore, the superintendents reserve the right to bar from competition animals, vegetables, flowers, poultry, products, and manufactured articles of decidedly inferior quality and those not possessing sufficient merit to warrant recognition.

9. Chairpersons of a department reserve the right to disqualify and remove from area any exhibitor whose behavior is disruptive to exhibiting and judging of entrees. Such person may be barred from future fair exhibiting.

10. The Fair Board of Directors may, at any time, order the removal of any exhibit or part of exhibit in poor condition and any article unfit to show may be excluded. No ribbon, trophies, awards, or exhibits may be removed at any time before the close of the fair. No trucks may enter the barn area prior to release time. Failure to comply will result in the forfeiture of premiums.

11. During the judging, buildings, except livestock arenas, are to be closed to everyone, except fair officials, judges, and necessary attendants. No exhibitor or his agent shall communicate with the judge during time of determining the awards, except to answer questions proposed by the judges. Any exhibitor interfering with the judges while making awards shall forfeit any premium to which he would otherwise be entitled.

12. All livestock for premium must be the property of the owner thirty (30) days or longer.

13. No person shall be allowed in the ring while stock is being judged, except judge superintendents and necessary attendants.

14. Should any animal awarded a prize be disqualified, the animals gaining the lower prize shall move into the next higher position if, in the opinion of the judges, the animals are worthy of such prizes.

15. Overfitting of cattle will be discriminated against.

Any artificial means used to change the form or shape of any animal will disqualify it from

competition.

16. When on exhibition in the ring, each animal must be under halter, except oxen, and in charge of owner or employee.

17. Joint ownership considered to be as one owner in accordance with registration paper.

18. Any junior exhibitor may be required to prove ability to reproduce entry, in any department, in the presence of a qualified person. All ages as of January 1st.

19. Any equine may be subject to a blood test.

20. Champion awards or trophies will be awarded only if there is competition within the breed, division, or event.

21. NOTE: AN ENTRY FEE FOR ALL ANIMALS MUST ACCOMPANY THE ENTRY BLANK. CHECKS MUST BE MADE PAYABLE TO WARREN COUNTY FAIR AND WILL NOT BE REFUNDED.

22. Start times subject to change due to length of preceding competitions.

23. Once animals are on the grounds, they must remain for the duration of the fair unless determined by the committee that they be removed due to illness, etc.

24. No animals on the grounds should have water, feed, hay, etc. withheld unless under a vet's care.

25. There is to be no permanent eating or sleeping areas in the barns as it is a major concern of diseases such as e-coli.

PREMIUMS

1. In paying premiums, no evidence of awards will be recognized except the entry book and sheets, signed by superintendents and judges. Ribbons, cards, and labels that may be attached to exhibits will not be recognized.

2. All premiums will be paid by check, by the Treasurer. **PREMIUM CHECKS WILL BE VOIDED 90 DAYS AFTER THEY ARE PRINTED.** While it is the full intent of the Warren County Fair, Inc. to pay all premiums as announced and won by exhibitors, in the event that the receipts of the Fair are not sufficient to meet all expenses and to pay all premiums, the Directors of the Warren County Fair reserve the right to pay premiums on a pro rata basis in full discharge of premium obligations. This provision shall not apply to special awards and premiums offered by others.

CAMPING

1. **CAMPING TRAILERS** The camping fee of \$130.00 for the week must be paid in full by June 1st. It is fully refundable up to 1 week before the

start of the Fair. Campers are permitted to hook up beginning Saturday and must be unhooked by the following Sunday. Campers coming into the fairgrounds prior to the Saturday before fair week or remaining after the close of fair week will be charged \$20/day. (Exceptions: primitive Campers) All campers must pay the fee at the Camper Registration Office and be placed by Fair Personnel. A season pass for each person within the trailer must be purchased at Camper Registration Office or the Fair Office. Campers may not be removed until after midnight Saturday night of the Fair. ***All trailers and equipment must be removed from the grounds within one week of the Fair closing.*** The Board of Directors reserves the right to reject any camper or persons.

2. Any house trailer or camper **MUST** be parked in the designated area.

SEASON PASSES

1. Season Passes (certain entertainment and track events not included) \$30.00 (2 years and over). Children under 2 are free at gate but must pay upgrade if they ride the rides.

MISCELLANEOUS

1. All buildings will open at 10:00 AM Fair will close at 11:00 PM and gates will be locked at midnight nightly. All persons must be in their respective area nightly no later than 1:00 AM.

2. All delivery persons and suppliers are requested to complete all their work and leave the grounds by 11:00 AM.

3. Concessionaires must confine themselves to space purchased and assigned. Failure to do so will work a forfeit of the privilege.

4. No unauthorized peddling on the grounds or in its vicinity.

5. No gambling, immoral exhibitions, intoxicated persons, alcoholic beverages, drugs or firearms will be allowed on the fairgrounds. Appropriate attire is required for all exhibitors.

6. Smoking in the buildings and barns is forbidden.

7. No unauthorized dogs, cats, or exotic animals, etc., will be allowed on the fairgrounds except at such time and at such location that may be designated by the Fair Board. All dogs, cats, and any other animals owned by resident campers must always be on a leash and under control and will be allowed in the campground only.

8. Bicycles, skateboards, roller blades, in-line skates, etc. are not permitted on the Fairgrounds.

9. **NO LASER LIGHTS OR POINTERS ARE PERMITTED ON THE FAIR GROUNDS.**

10. During Fair week, for identification purposes, any person 18 years of age & under remaining on the Fairgrounds overnight must wear a wristband that will be available from the Barn Chairperson or, in the case of campers, at the Fair Office.

11. The only golf cart, ATVs, etc. permitted on the Fair grounds are those used for official Fair business and those used by handicapped persons. All units must be registered at the Fair Office and handicapped usage is limited to transporting that person to and from the campground only. These units cannot be operated on main walkways. Proof of liability insurance is required, and The Executive Committee has the authority to enforce this rule.

WARREN COUNTY FAIR ANIMAL HEALTH RULES

Pennsylvania Cattle:

1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued after May 1, 2023.

2. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this should be written on the CVI.

3. Individual official animal identification. Official ID will have a US shield  and includes:

A USDA-issued National Uniform Eartagging System (NUES) tag; or

A 15-digit Animal Identification Number eartag starting with “840” (including RFID) or other official identification approved by PDA. (Brands and breed registrations with tattoos are not acceptable).


4. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian is recommended for animals 3 months of age and older (*market cattle are exempt*).

Out of State Cattle:

1. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within the 30 days prior to the date of importation is required.

2. Vesicular Stomatitis (VS): (applies to states that experienced a Vesicular Stomatitis outbreak in the last 12 months). An accredited veterinarian shall determine whether the animals are free from VS, and animals shall be accompanied by a CVI with the following statement signed by the accredited veterinarian: “All animals identified on this certificate of veterinary inspection have been examined and found to be free from VS. During the past 90 days, these animals were not located within 10 miles of a site where VS has been diagnosed.”

3. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI.

4. Individual official animal identification is required. Official ID will have a US shield  and includes:

A USDA-issued National Uniform Ear tagging System (NUES) tag; or

A 15-digit Animal Identification Number starting with “840” ear tag (including RFID) or

Other official identification approved by USDA. (Brands and breed registrations with tattoos are not acceptable).

5. Testing: Tuberculosis Requirements:

No test is required for animals originating from “Accredited Free” states or zones.

All exhibition animals originating from states or zones designated “Modified Accredited Advanced” must be test negative within the 60 days prior to the date of importation. The negative test results and date of test must be included on the CVI or the animal must be accompanied by a negative test report (a copy of the original report is acceptable).

All animals originating from states or zones designated “Modified Accredited” must originate from herds in which all animals 12 months of age and older are test negative within the 12 months prior to the date of importation; and the individual animals to be imported (all ages) are test negative within the 60 days prior to the date of importation and at least 60 days after the negative whole herd test. The negative test results and date of test must be included on the CVI or the animal must be accompanied by a negative test report (a copy of the original test report is acceptable).

6. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian is recommended for animals 3 months of age and older (*market cattle are exempt*).

Pennsylvania Equine Animals:

1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued after May 1, 2023.

2. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this should be written on the CVI.

3. All equine animals must be tested negative for EIA by an official test within the 12 months prior to the opening date of the exhibition. Laboratory test results must accompany each animal to its final destination (a copy of the original lab report is acceptable). The CVI shall specify the date of sample collection, date of results, and results of the EIA test, along with the accession number and the

name of the testing laboratory. Foals less than six months of age accompanied by a test-negative dam are exempt from EIA testing requirements. If the foal is not accompanied by the dam, a copy of the dam's test results must accompany the foal to its final destination.

4. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian is recommended for animals 3 months of age and older.

Out of State Equine Animals:

1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within the 30 days prior to the date of importation is required.

2. Vesicular Stomatitis (VS): (applies to states that experienced a Vesicular Stomatitis outbreak in the last 12 months). An accredited veterinarian shall determine whether the animals are free from VS, and animals shall be accompanied by a CVI with the following statement signed by the accredited veterinarian: "All animals identified on this certificate of veterinary inspection have been examined and found to be free from VS. During the past 90 days, these animals were not located within 10 miles of a site where VS has been diagnosed."

3. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI.

4. All equine animals must be tested negative for EIA by an official test within the 12 months prior to the date of importation. Laboratory test results must accompany each animal to its final destination (a copy of the original lab report is acceptable). The CVI shall specify the date of sample collection, date of results, and results of the EIA test, along with the accession number and the name of the testing laboratory. Foals less than six months of age accompanied by a test-negative dam are exempt from EIA testing requirements. If the foal is not accompanied by the dam, a copy of the dam's test results must accompany the foal to its final destination.

5. If an equine animal has resided in Texas or New Mexico for a cumulative total of 30 days or more within the six months preceding the date of entry into the Commonwealth, that animal must be test-negative for *Babesia caballi* and *Theileria equi* on a competitive enzyme-linked immunosorbent assay (c-ELISA) test, or a department-approved equivalent test, with the test occurring within the 30 days preceding entry into Pennsylvania. The date of test

and the test results shall be written on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.

6. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian is recommended for animals 3 months of age and older.

Pennsylvania Goats:

Individual official animal identification is required for all goats. Official ID includes:

A USDA ear tag with a US shield^{US}; or

A legible tattoo with herd and individual identification recognized in an approved USDA Scrapie database a.k.a. scrapie tattoo (only for herds enrolled in the USDA Voluntary Scrapie Herd Certification Program) or

A breed registration tattoo if the animal is accompanied by a registration certificate and the tattoo is legible.

1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued after May 1, 2023.

2. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this should be written on the CVI.

Section 11: Out of State Goats:

1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within the 30 days prior to the date of importation.

2. Vesicular Stomatitis (VS): (applies to states that experienced a Vesicular Stomatitis outbreak in the last 12 months). An accredited veterinarian shall determine whether the animals are free from VS, and animals shall be accompanied by a CVI with the following statement signed by the accredited veterinarian: "All animals identified on this certificate of veterinary inspection have been examined and found to be free from VS. During the past 90 days, these animals were not located within 10 miles of a site where VS has been diagnosed."

3. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI.

4. Individual official animal identification is required for all goats. Official ID includes:

i. A USDA ear tag with a US shield^{US}; or

ii. A legible tattoo with herd and individual identification recognized in an approved USDA Scrapie database a.k.a. scrapie tattoo (only for herds enrolled in the USDA Voluntary Scrapie Herd Certification Program) or

iii. A breed registration tattoo if the animal is accompanied by a registration certificate and the tattoo is legible.

5. Testing requirements: Tuberculosis:

♣ No test is required for animals originating from states or zones designated as accredited-free by the USDA.

♣ All animals originating from states or zones designated modified accredited advanced by the USDA must be test negative within the 60 days prior to the date of importation. The negative test results and date of test must be included on the CVI or the animal must be accompanied by a negative test report (a copy of the original report is acceptable).

♣ All animals originating from states or zones designated modified accredited must originate from herds in which all animals 12 months of age and older have tested negative within the 12 months prior to the date of importation; and the individual animals (all ages) to be imported have also tested negative within the 60 days prior to the date of importation and at least 60 days after the negative whole herd test was completed. The negative test results and date of test must be included on the CVI or the animal must be accompanied by a negative test report (a copy of the original test report is acceptable).

Pennsylvania Rabbits:

All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases.

Out of State Rabbits:

Requirements:

No rabbits or their products, such as, meat, pelts, hides, carcasses or other items, and no equipment, exposed feed, forages, or conveyances or other items or associated materials may enter the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania from a Commonwealth, State, Territory, or Country where Rabbit Hemorrhagic Disease (RHD) has been diagnosed in the prior twelve (12) months or there is a reasonable suspicion it exists unless they meet the following requirements:

(a) All live rabbits must be accompanied by an ICVI and must be examined by an accredited veterinarian within the seventy-two (72) hours prior to the date of shipment to the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. The ICVI must include statements by an accredited veterinarian certifying that:

(i) All rabbits in the shipment have been examined for and found free of infectious, contagious or

communicable diseases;

(ii) All rabbits have originated from a single premises that has no signs of infectious, contagious or communicable disease in rabbits;

(iii) There have been no movements of rabbits onto the premises of origin within the 90 days prior to the date of shipment; and

(iv) The rabbits have had no contact with wild or captive rabbits other than their cohorts in the 90 days prior to the date of shipment.

(b) No rabbits or their products, such as, meat, pelts, hides, carcasses or other items, and no equipment, exposed feed or conveyances or other items or associated materials may enter the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania from a premises exposed to, contaminated with or known to be affected with RHD, or where there is a reasonable suspicion the disease exists or the rabbits have been exposed to or infected with RHD. Fair management has the authority to impose additional requirements designed to prevent the spread of contagious diseases.

Recommendations:


For Rabbits that originate from a from a Commonwealth, State, Territory, or Country where RHD has NOT been diagnosed in the prior twelve (12) months or there is NO reasonable suspicion it exists:

1. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within 30 days prior to the date of importation.

2. A statement on the CVI attesting that all rabbits listed on the CVI are free of signs of infectious and contagious disease.

Pennsylvania Sheep:

Individual official USDA scrapie animal identification is required for all sheep. Official scrapie ID includes:

A USDA ear tag with a US shield  ; or

A legible tattoo with herd and individual identification recognized in an approved USDA Scrapie database a.k.a. a scrapie tattoo (only for flocks enrolled in the USDA Voluntary Scrapie Flock Certification Program) or

A breed registration tattoo if the animals are accompanied by a registration certificate (copy acceptable) and the tattoo is legible.

1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued after May 1, 2023.

2. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this should be written on the CVI.

3. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian is recommended for animals 3 months of age and older.


Out of State Sheep:

1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within the 30 days prior to entry into PA is required.

2. Vesicular Stomatitis (VS): (applies to states that experienced a Vesicular Stomatitis outbreak in the last 12 months). An accredited veterinarian shall determine whether the animals are free from VS, and animals shall be accompanied by a CVI with the following statement signed by the accredited veterinarian: "All animals identified on this certificate of veterinary inspection have been examined and found to be free from VS. During the past 90 days, these animals were not located within 10 miles of a site where VS has been diagnosed."

3. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI.

4. Individual official USDA scrapie animal identification is required. Official scrapie ID includes:

A USDA ear tag with a US shield  ; or

A legible tattoo with herd and individual identification recognized in an approved USDA Scrapie database; a.k.a. A scrapie tattoo (only for flocks enrolled in USDA Voluntary Scrapie Flock Program or

A breed registration tattoo if the animals are accompanied by a registration certificate. (copy acceptable) and the tattoo is legible.

5. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian is recommended for animals 3 months of age and older.

Pennsylvania Swine:

Requirements:

1. No swine species shall be exhibited in Pennsylvania unless each animal:

- Is accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI) issued within 14 days of the fair.
- Is permanently identified by an official 840 series radio frequency identification

(RFID) ear tag and the ear tag number is recorded on the CVI:

- Has been visually inspected and found to be free of signs of contagious disease immediately prior to unloading at the exhibition by an accredited veterinarian or swine health monitor appointed by the fair board or livestock show committee.

3. All Market swine exhibited in Department sponsored Market shows shall move directly to a PDA or USDA licensed slaughter facility following the animal exhibition and may not be diverted to premises other than a recognized slaughter establishment or a slaughter market in which the sales are designated slaughter only sales.

Out of State Swine:

Requirements:

1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within the 14 days prior to the date of the show is required. The CVI shall include a statement verifying that the swine have not been fed raw garbage.

2. Vesicular Stomatitis (VS) Statement: This applies to states that experienced a VS outbreak in the last 12 months. In these cases, an accredited veterinarian shall determine whether the animals are free from VS, and animals shall be accompanied by a CVI with the following statement signed by the accredited veterinarian: "All animals identified on this CVI have been examined and found to be free from VS. During the past 90 days, these animals were not located within 10 miles of a site where VS has been diagnosed."

3. All animals must be free of evidence of Infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI.

4. Has been visually inspected and found to be free of signs of contagious disease immediately prior to unloading at the exhibition by an accredited veterinarian or swine health monitor appointed by the fair board or livestock show committee.

5. Individual animal ID – must be permanently identified by an official 840 series radio frequency identification (RFID) ear tag and the ear tag number is recorded on the CVI.

6. Brucellosis Testing Requirements:

No test required if the animal originates from a validated brucellosis-free state or brucellosis-free herd. All others must be tested negative within the 30 days prior to the date of importation.

7. Pseudorabies Testing Requirements:

a. Sexually intact swine over 6 months of age shall originate qualified PRV negative herd or be test negative to an official pseudorabies test within 30 days prior to importation.

b. No pseudorabies testing required for all other swine.

9. All Market swine exhibited in Department sponsored Market shows shall move directly to a PDA or USDA licensed slaughter facility following the animal exhibition and may not be diverted to premises other than a recognized slaughter establishment or a slaughter market in which the sales are designated slaughter only sales.

POULTRY SHOW HAS BEEN CANCELLED
Pennsylvania Poultry, Including Chickens,
Turkeys, Waterfowl, Upland Game Birds,
Ratites; and Pigeons, Doves and Other Avian
Species and Hatching Eggs

Requirements:

1. All Pennsylvania poultry, including chickens, turkeys, waterfowl, and upland game birds entering an exhibition must bear an official PDA-issued crimp style or butt end style leg band. Ratites must be identified with a neck band or an electronic implant device (the exhibitor must supply a reader). Pigeons, doves, and avian species other than poultry must bear a unique individual identification leg band but do not have to be identified with an official PDA leg band.

2. An Owner-endorsed Avian Health Certificate or a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (health chart or CVI) must accompany all Pennsylvania poultry, including chickens, turkeys, waterfowl, upland game birds, and ratites; and pigeons, doves, and other avian species; and hatching eggs. The certificate must include the following:

Name and location of exhibition; and Name, address, and telephone number of the owner; and

A statement that the entries and the flock of origin are free of evidence of infectious and contagious diseases; and Description of the birds/hatching eggs; and Owner signature and date of that signature.

3. Avian Influenza Testing and Verification: All samples must be collected by a Certified Poultry Technician or a Category II Accredited Veterinarian. All poultry, including chickens, turkeys, waterfowl, upland game birds, and ratites (pigeons, doves, and avian species other than poultry are excluded), and their hatching eggs for exhibition must originate from a flock in which a random, representative sample of a minimum of 30 birds, 3 weeks of age or older, were tested for avian influenza within the **30** days prior to opening date of the exhibition. The birds or hatching eggs must be accompanied by the most recent test report (copy acceptable). Test results must be negative. If there are fewer than 30 birds in the flock, test all birds. For waterfowl, cloacal swab samples must be collected for testing instead of blood samples, and the swabs may be tested using PCR techniques. Swabs from geese and ducks may not be combined in the same tube for testing. Untested birds shall not be comingled with or added to the tested flock after negative samples have been collected and before the show.

4. Pullorum-typhoid Testing and Verification: All samples must be collected by a Certified Poultry Technician or a Category II Accredited Veterinarian. Poultry, including chickens, turkeys, upland game birds and ratites (PA waterfowl are excluded and pigeons, doves, and avian species other than poultry are excluded) and their hatching eggs must originate from a flock in good standing on the NPIP Pullorumtyphoid Clean Program (and there was no break in the chain of ownership by NPIP participants) and the birds must be accompanied by an NPIP 9-3 form with that flock's NPIP number; or from a flock in good standing on the PA Pullorum Equivalent Program. The birds or hatching eggs must be accompanied by the most recent test report (copy acceptable). If the rapid whole-blood plate agglutination test was done, the most recent NPIP 9-2 form or state equivalent form must accompany the birds or hatching eggs (copy acceptable). Test results must be negative. **OR** All individual birds (PA waterfowl are excluded and pigeons, doves and avian species other than poultry are excluded) for exhibition (maximum of 300) must have had a pullorum-typhoid test within the 90 days prior to the opening date of the

exhibition. The birds must be accompanied by the most recent test report, or state equivalent form for the rapid test (copies acceptable). Test results must be negative. The following age restrictions apply: Chickens shall be tested at 4 months of age or older. Turkeys shall be tested at 12 weeks of age or older. Game birds shall be tested at 4 months of age or older, or upon sexual maturity, whichever comes first. Ratites shall be tested at 12 months of age or older. All birds not meeting these age restrictions at the time of sampling are exempt from pullorum-typhoid testing requirements.

Out of State Poultry, Including Chickens, Turkeys, Waterfowl, Upland Game Birds, Ratites; and Pigeons, Doves and Other Avian Species and Hatching Eggs
Requirements:

1. All poultry, including chickens, turkeys, waterfowl, and upland game birds entering an exhibition must bear an official leg band issued by the state or country of origin.

2. Ratites must be identified with a neck band or an electronic implant device (the exhibitor must supply a reader). Pigeons, doves, and avian species other than poultry must bear a unique individual identification leg band but do not have to be identified with an official state leg band.

3. An Owner-endorsed Avian Health Certificate or a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (health chart or CVI) must accompany all poultry, including chickens, turkeys, waterfowl, upland game birds, and ratites; and pigeons, doves, and other avian species; and hatching eggs. The Avian health Certificate or CVI must include the following:

- a. The testing laboratory name, test accession number(s), and a statement indicating negative test results; and
- b. Name and location of exhibition; and
- c. Name, address, and telephone number of the owner; and
- d. Description of the birds/hatching eggs; and
- e. A statement that the entries and the flock of origin are free of evidence of infectious and contagious diseases; and
- f. Owner signature and date of that signature.

4. **IMPORTANT:** A copy of the Owner Endorsed

Avian Interstate/International Health Statement or CVI and the laboratory test report including negative test results must also be sent to PDA within the seven (7) days after the date of entry into Pennsylvania.

5. Avian Influenza Testing and Verification:

All samples must be collected by a Certified Poultry Technician or a Category II Accredited Veterinarian. All poultry, including chickens, turkeys, waterfowl, upland game birds, and ratites, (pigeons, doves and avian species other than poultry are excluded), and their hatching eggs must originate from a flock in which a random, representative sample of a minimum;

a. of 30 birds, 3 weeks of age or older, were tested for avian influenza within the **30** days prior to the opening date of the exhibition. The birds or hatching eggs must be accompanied by the most recent test report (copy acceptable). Test results must be negative. If there are fewer than 30 birds in the flock, test all birds. For waterfowl, cloacal swab samples must be collected for testing, and the swabs may be tested using PCR techniques. Swabs from geese and ducks may not be combined in the same tube for testing. Untested birds shall not be comingled with or added to the tested flock after negative samples have been collected and before the show.

6. Pullorum-typhoid Testing and Verification:

All samples must be collected by a Certified Poultry Technician or a Category II Accredited Veterinarian.

1. All poultry, including upland chickens, turkeys, upland game birds, waterfowl, and ratites (pigeons, doves and avian species other than poultry are excluded) and hatching eggs must come from NPIP Pullorum-typhoid Clean flocks in good standing with the program (and there was no break in the chain of ownership by NPIP participants) and the birds must be accompanied by an NPIP 9-3 form with that flock's NPIP number: **OR**

2. All individual birds for exhibition, including upland chickens, turkeys, upland game birds, waterfowl, and ratites (pigeons, doves, and avian species other than poultry are excluded) (maximum of 300) must have had a negative pullorum-typhoid test within the 30 days prior to

the opening date of the opening date of the exhibition. The birds must be accompanied by the most recent test report (copy acceptable). If the rapid whole-blood plate agglutination test was done, the most recent state form for the rapid test (copies acceptable) must accompany the birds (copy acceptable). Test results must be negative. The following age restrictions apply to comply with NPIP standards:

- 3. Chickens shall be tested at 4 months of age or older.
- 4. Turkeys shall be tested at 12 weeks of age or older.
- 5. Game birds shall be tested at 4 months of age or older, or upon sexual maturity, whichever comes first.
- 6. Ratites shall be tested at 12 months of age or older.
- 7. Waterfowl shall be tested at 4 months of age or older.
- 8. All birds not meeting these age restrictions at the time of sampling must come from a flock in which all the eligible birds in the flock (up to 300) have been test negative within the 30 days prior to the opening date of the exhibition.

9. OFFICIAL OWNER ENDORSED AVIAN HEALTH CERTIFICATE FOR ALL EXHIBITION BIRDS AND THEIR HATCHING EGGS

a. A completed owner-endorsed avian health certificate or a certificate of veterinary inspection must accompany all avian species and their hatching eggs to an exhibition. The certificate must be presented to exhibition management prior to cooping of all avian species or display of hatching eggs. This owner endorsed health certificate *must* be endorsed with the bird owner’s signature. The following information is required:

4. Verification of Testing for all poultry, including chickens, turkeys, waterfowl, game birds (such as pheasants, partridge, quail, grouse, and guineas), ratites, and hatching eggs (all samples must be collected by a Certified Poultry Technician or a Category II Accredited Veterinarian):

- a. Avian influenza testing and verification:
- b. Pullorum-typhoid testing and verification
- i. National Animal Health Laboratory Network (NAHLN) protocols for sample collection, including the number of swabs/tube of viral transport media (see vi and vii below), and testing shall be followed. All samples must be tested at a NAHLN laboratory.
- ii. All poultry, including chickens, turkeys, waterfowl, game birds, and ratites, and their hatching eggs must originate from a flock in which a random, representative sample of a minimum of 30 birds, three (3) weeks of age or older, were tested for avian influenza within the 30 days prior to entry into the exhibition.
- iii. If there are fewer than 30 birds in the flock, all birds of age must be tested.

- iii. Test results must be negative.
- iv. All poultry and hatching eggs must be accompanied by the most recent test report (photocopies are acceptable).
- v. Chickens, turkeys, game birds, and ratites may meet the testing requirements with blood testing or tracheal/oropharyngeal swab testing. If swab samples are collected, swabs from different species — e.g., chickens and turkeys — may not be combined in a tube of viral transport media (BHI). If 5 or fewer swabs are collected per tube, the swab tips may be left in the tube. If between 5 and 11 swabs per tube are collected, swirl the swab tip in the BHI liquid, press the swab tip against the inner surface of the tube to remove excess material into the tube, and discard the swab in a biosecure manner.
- vi. Waterfowl such as ducks and geese must be tested with cloacal swab samples. Swabs from different species — e.g., ducks and geese — may not be combined in a tube of viral transport media (BHI). Up to 5 swabs may be placed per tube for waterfowl testing. Swab tips may be left in the tube.
- vii. Poultry not meeting the testing requirements shall not be comingled with or added to the tested flock after negative samples have been collected and before poultry or hatching eggs enter the exhibition.

Poultry, including chickens, turkeys, game birds, and ratites (waterfowl are excluded), and their hatching eggs;

- (1). Must originate from a flock currently enrolled, tested, and in good standing on the NPIP Pullorumtyphoid Clean Program, with no break in the chain of ownership by NPIP participants, and the poultry or hatching eggs must be accompanied by the most recent laboratory test report or 9-3 form (*Report of Sales of Hatching Eggs, Chicks, or Poults*) which includes the NPIP number; or NPIP 9-2 form (*Flock Selecting and Testing Report*) for the rapid whole blood agglutination plate test which includes the NPIP number (photocopies are acceptable); or

(2). Must originate from a flock currently enrolled, tested, and in good standing on the PA Pullorum Equivalent Program, with no break in the chain of ownership by program participants, and the poultry or hatching eggs must be accompanied by the most recent laboratory test report which includes the program enrollment number, or state rapid test reporting form for the rapid whole blood agglutination plate test for pullorum-typhoid which includes the program enrollment number (photocopies are acceptable); or

- (3). All individual poultry, including chickens, turkeys, game birds, and ratites (waterfowl are excluded), or poultry providing hatching eggs (maximum of 300 from a flock) entering a Pennsylvania exhibition must have had a pullorum-typhoid test within the ninety (90) days prior to the opening date of the exhibition. The poultry or hatching eggs must be accompanied by the most recent laboratory test report; or the Department's rapid test reporting form for the rapid whole blood agglutination plate test for pullorumtyphoid performed on non-NPIP birds (photocopies are acceptable).

(4). Test results must be negative.

(5). The following age restrictions apply for pullorum-typhoid testing:

- ☐ Chickens shall be tested at 4 months of age or older.
- ☐ Turkeys shall be tested at 12 weeks of age or older.
- ☐ Game birds shall be tested at 4 months of age or older, or upon sexual maturity, whichever comes first.
- ☐ Ratites shall be tested at 12 months of age or older.
- ☐ Poultry which is individually tested for pullorum for exhibition must have a negative pullorum test if of age at the time of entry into the exhibition.

4. Bird identification: All poultry, including chickens, turkeys, waterfowl, and game birds entering an exhibition must bear an individual **OFFICIAL STATE LEG BAND**. For PA poultry, official crimp-style leg bands will show "PDA" on

the bands, and official Butt-end band numbers begin with the prefix “PA”. Ratites must be identified with a neck band or an electronic implant device (the exhibitor must supply a reader). Pigeons, doves, and other avian species such as psittacines and passerines must bear a unique individual identification leg band (official state leg bands are not required except for poultry).

Description of all birds (number, age, color, gender) or hatching eggs:

5. Verification of avian health status: All avian species (and hatching eggs) for exhibition or display are free from evidence of infectious and contagious diseases.

6. Owner Endorsement:

I certify that the above information represents a true and accurate statement regarding my bird(s) and their home flock(s). I further attest and affirm that a “veterinarian consultation relationship” – as that phrase is defined in the Animal Exhibition Sanitation Law found at 3 Pa.C.S.A. § 2501 *et seq.* and any amendments thereto – “exists with regard to any avian species and their hatching eggs which I will be exhibiting”. The name and phone number of the consulting veterinarian must be included on the entry form.

6. Testing specifics/Records requirements

a. Sample collectors and testers must maintain records of animal identification, approved rapid testing, and any other records required by the Domestic Animal Law, and any order issued by the Department for a minimum of two years and must

make records available to the Department upon request.

b. National Animal Health Laboratory Network (NAHLN) protocols for sample collection, including the number of swabs/tubes of viral transport media, and testing shall be followed. All samples must be tested at a NAHLN laboratory. (excluding the Pullorumtyphoid rapid whole blood plate agglutination test that may be conducted at farm)

CODE OF SHOW RING ETHICS

Exhibitors of animals at livestock shows shall at all times deport themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to junior as well as open class exhibitors who complete in structured classes of competition.

All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited from future exhibition in accordance with the rules adopted by the respective fairs and livestock shows. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all livestock shows in the United States.

The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events:

1. All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age, or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.
2. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or responsible person shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request

by fair or livestock show officials.

3. Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at fairs or livestock shows.

4. Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of drugs. The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer and/or responsible person for show management to obtain any specimens of saliva, blood, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Animals not entered in an event which culminates with the animals entering the food chain shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with applicable federal, state, and provincial statutes, regulations, and rules. Livestock shall not be exhibited if the drugs administered in accordance with federal, state, and provincial statutes, regulation and rules affect the performance or appearance at the event. If the laboratory report on the chemical analysis of saliva, urine, blood, or other sample taken from livestock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be prime facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood, or other substance tested by the approved laboratory to which it is send is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservation, transfer to the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was take, with the burden on the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise at any hearing in regard to the matter conducted by the fair or livestock show. At any time after an animal arrives on the fair or livestock show premises, all treatments involving the use of drugs and/or medications shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian.

5. Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar

substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, confirmation, or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal is prohibited.

6. The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, use electrical contrivance, or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited.

7. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representative, or show officials before, during or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.

8. No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action.

9. The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or participant whether he or she was instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.

10. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or responsible person to have any disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show against such individuals published in any publication of the IAFE, including Fairs and Expositions and any special notices to member.

11. The act of entering of an animal in a fair or livestock show is the giving of verification by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or responsible

person that he or she has read the IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics and understand the consequences of and penalties provided for actions prohibited by the code. It is further a consent that any action which contravenes these rules and is also a violation of federal, state, or provincial statutes, regulations or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infractions.

12. Veterinarian Consultation Relationship

A relationship in which the owner or caretaker of the animal has assumed responsibility to consult a veterinarian and has agreed to follow the instructions of the veterinarian in relation to zoonotic diseases and implementing best management practices intended to reduce and prevent diseases. Your signature on the entry form confirms your compliance.

6. No grade stallions shall be accepted for entry.

7. Farm horses should not have scotch plates or scotch housing.

8. All animals entered **must** compete and be shown in halter class and hitch class if broken.

9. In no case is it permissible to show mixed breeds in the same class or section to be judged against each other for premiums.

10. General rules and regulations governing the fair will be followed.

5. The Fair Board reserves the right to refuse any or all entries.
6. All trailers will be parked in an area so designated by the Fair Board.
7. This Department is open to Miniature Horses only.
8. Animals shown in this Department cannot be shown in any other Department.
9. A Copy of current Coggins, Rabies, CVI and Registration Papers (if applicable) must be provided to a committee member by Tuesday of the fair.
10. No horse shall be entitled to a premium unless serviceably sound.
11. No horse showing clinical signs of any contagious or infectious disease will be admitted to any show. (SEE HEALTH RULES)
12. Any equine may be subject to blood test.
13. Stalls are assigned at the discretion of the committee. Stall assignments will be available upon arrival to the fairgrounds.
14. Each animal must have an Exhibitor/Animal Name Card displayed on their stall. The card shall remain on the stall until the animal is removed from the Fairgrounds.
15. No grade stallions shall be accepted for entry.
16. All animals must be 40" or under to qualify to exhibit at the Fair in all driving and in-hand classes.
17. The committee reserves the right to measure any animal of questionable height. If an animal is found to be over the allowable height, the animal will be disqualified and not allowed to exhibit or collect premiums.

2. **Exhibitors will be expected** to display or parade their animals as directed by the Superintendent; **to accept the stall assigned without controversy**; to keep their animals in an attractive appearance, and to cooperate with the department in every way that may serve to increase the educational value of the show. **Stalling assignments will not be posted before Friday, August 4th. No set up before Friday, August 4th.**

3. Exhibitors of livestock must inform themselves as to when their stock will be judged. Stock must be in the ring promptly on call, and a failure to comply with the order renders exhibitors liable to be ruled out of competition.

4. Exhibitors will be expected to keep the space they occupy in a clean and sanitary condition and

remove all their equipment promptly as the Superintendent may direct.

5. Identification cards will be provided for each animal.

6. Original registration papers will be checked on all cattle by the superintendent or his committee prior to show and shall be available on show day upon request. Registered dairy cattle may be entered into one of the seven dairy breeds as recognized by the Purebred Dairy Cattle Association. All other registered dairy cattle will be entered in the "Other" breeds show. All breeds must follow their breed association's registration and show eligibility requirements. Specifically, **Jerseys**: Animals with Genetic Recovery (fully registered) certificates are eligible. This does not include Original Animals (OA) or Provisional Registry (PR) animals.

Guernseys: Females in Step 4 of the Genetic Recovery program are eligible. Step 4 females have a "GR" prefix in their name. No other prefixes are eligible. **Holsteins**: Any animal identified with Holstein Association, USA, Inc., that is 87% or higher Registered Holstein Ancestry (RHA) is eligible. **Red & White**: Females must carry 87% dairy bloodlines as designated by RWDCA guidelines. Dairy bloodlines include Ayrshire, Brown Swiss, Guernsey, Holstein (Black & White and Red & White), Jersey, Milking Shorthorn, Angler, Swedish Red, Aussie Red, Lineback, and Rouge Flammande.

7. No animal can be shown in both beef and dairy classes.

8. Only Female animals are to be exhibited.

9. The lifetime production cow class shall be 125,000 pounds for Holstein cattle and 100,000 pounds for all other breeds.

10. All animals while in the show ring must be identified by the exhibitor's number.

11. All trailers will be parked in an area so designated by the Fair Board.

12. The milking parlor WILL NOT be open until 5:00 pm on Monday, August 7.

13. Original copies of health charts must arrive on the Fairgrounds with the animals. Health charts and original registration papers must remain on the Fairgrounds until the animals leave the grounds.

- A. Name and location of the show.
- B. Name, address, and telephone number of flock owner.
- C. The following information applies:
 - 1) Verification by certification that all birds were vaccinated against Laryngotracheiti, Laryngotracheitis
 - 2) Chickens, turkeys, guineas and other fowl must be accompanied by a pullorum free certificate

3) Pertaining to purchased birds; a statement must be included verifying the fact the flock of origin was free of contagious disease.

4. No bird will be accepted on the day of the fair without a prior completed health certificate properly filled out.

5. Since all birds returned from the show are potential sources of infection to other birds, they should be isolated immediately after their return, separate and apart from all other birds. This isolation should be maintained indefinitely, if possible or at least until it has been established that the birds are not carriers of disease producing agents, as may be determined by exposure of a few susceptible birds to direct contact with them.

6. It is suggested that the birds entered, or the entire flock from which they come, be immunized against those diseases for which approved vaccines and methods are available.

7. No exhibitor may show more than 12 varieties, 48 birds per family. Entries will be received until such time as the cooping capacity is reached.

8. The management reserves the right to reduce the number or entries from one party, if the cooping facilities are exhausted.

9. The American Standard of Perfection will govern poultry judging within the limitations as set forth in the General Rules and Rules of this Department

10. Entered specimens must be bonafide property of exhibitor. All poultry must be separately cooped and clearly marked as to sex and class. During the continuance of the show, all birds will be examined carefully each day. Birds showing signs of disease will be segregated by the owner or his employee for removal from the show. Birds will be handled only by the judge or authorized fair official.

1. Warren County Fair animal health rules are to be followed in all animal departments and contests. The complete requirements are listed in the front of the Warren County Fair Premium Book.

2. Refer to General Rules and to Rules and Regulations in Department 2, including the expectation that all 4-H animal science youth are required to participate in training regarding “Quality Animal Management” annually. All youth are

required to complete a survey regarding these practices.

3. 4-H Club and FFA members must be present and have charge of their animals at the time of judging.

4. All 4-H project entries must have satisfactorily completed their project. First year 4-H dairy club members may show a maximum of three (3) animals, second year members a maximum of four (4) animals, third year members or older a maximum of ten (10) animals in the show. The names of all dairy animals and registration or ear tag number are due by June 1 to the Warren County 4-H office or the online enrollment system.

5. OWNERSHIP

A. Animals bred and owned by the exhibitor must be registered in the exhibitor's name June 1.

B. Animals not bred by the exhibitor must be transferred into exhibitor's name on or before June 1. Date of transfer shown on the registration certificate will be considered as date of ownership in all classes.

C. Leased animals are eligible to be shown if a management plan is carried out. Leases must be sent to the 4-H Office by June 1.

D. Grade animals are permitted to be shown in the Warren County 4-H Dairy Show only.

E. Animals intending to be shown at regional and state Junior Dairy Shows must follow the same breed registration requirements as the PA Junior Dairy Show.

6. No animal over one year of age should have horns.

7. Health papers issued by the Pennsylvania Bureau of Animal Industry are required for all animals and will be checked by the show personnel during check in on Monday. A copy of the health paperwork must stay at the fairgrounds.

8. Any substitution of an animal or changes in showmanship and fitting participation must receive prior approval from the Dairy Show Committee. See the first page of this year's 4-H Dairy Show Guidelines to review the current year's show committee. Substitutions made for the Tuesday fitting competition will not be placed. Animals being substituted for showmanship, must be a registered Warren County 4-H project animal. The substituted showmanship animal must receive approval from the Dairy Show Committee and cannot be used by another 4-H member for showmanship. Exemptions from participating during the

normally scheduled fitting or showmanship competition must be cleared with the show committee and will only be granted in cases of scheduling conflict with other fair events and/or emergency. The 4-H member will be required to make alternative arrangements to clip one project animal in the presence of a dairy leader.

9. ENTRY FEE OF \$2.00 PER ANIMAL MUST ACCOMPANY THE ENTRY BLANK. All 4-H Dairy exhibitors are required to complete all entry data requested online. For grade animals, place "N/A" in the registration number data cell. IF A 4-H EXHIBITOR IS COMPETING IN THE OPEN SHOW, YOU MUST FOLLOW THE INSTRUCTIONS FOR THE OPEN SHOW.

10. No ribbons, trophies, awards, equipment, or exhibit may be removed at any time before the close of the Fair or Department.

11. Warren County 4-H Dairy Leaders understand there are times when youth need to leave the grounds for a variety of reasons during the week of fair. Members needing to leave the grounds must arrange care for their animals and have approval from their 4-H leader before leaving the fairgrounds.

12. See Department 2 Dairy Cattle, Section 2, Warren County Fair Herdsman Award for a new recognition program which includes 4-H Dairy Members.

13. Only Female animals can be exhibited.

14. Yearlings in milk will show as Jr. Two year old.

2. Animals must meet all eligibility requirements of the Warren County Fair Youth Livestock Auction Rules and Regulations in order to show including being pre-tagged and weighed except Class 309.

3. Animals shown in breeding classes cannot be shown in market classes or vice versa.

4. Animal must be declared as “Small Breed” on paperwork at initial weigh-in. Height regulations, maximum hip height of 47”. The measurement will be taken at fair weigh-in, a standardized measurement system (set up the same, measured by same person). Animal must weigh MINIMUM 500lbs, and MAXIMUM 1000lbs, at fair weigh in.

If animal does not meet weight requirements, it will not be allowed to show. If the animal meets the minimum weight of 900 the animal would have the option to show as a lightweight market steer instead of a small breed animal. If the animal meets the county requirements for sale it would also be eligible for sale as a completed 4-H beef project.

5. The market beef will be divided as equally as possible into 3 weight classes. All market beef will be weighed at the fair. The number of classes may fluctuate and will be established at the discretion of the section chair. Market Classes may be split at the discretion of the chair if class size exceeds 7 entries.

6. Weigh in to be done beginning at 5:30PM on Monday of the fair.

7. Market beef falling in the feeder class or overweight class are not eligible for Grand Champion or Reserve Champion and are not eligible to be sold at the Warren County Fair Youth Livestock Auction.

Bureau of Animal Industry by the Fair Board

Secretary no less than 10 days before the fair
opens. Therefore, poultry entries are due July 15.

3. Movements onto show premises will be
permitted only by a prior properly completed and
endorsed health certificate. The contents shall
include:

a. Name and location of show.

b. Name, address, and telephone number of
the flock owner.

i. The following information applies:

ii. Verification of certification that all birds
were vaccinated against Laryngotracheiti,
Laryngotracheitis.

iv. Chickens and turkeys must be
accompanied by a pullorum free certificate.

v. Pertaining to purchased birds, a statement
must be included verifying the fact the flock of
origin was free of contagious disease.

4. No bird will be accepted on the day of the fair
without a prior completed health certificate.

5. Since all birds returned from the show are
potential sources of infection to other birds, they
should be isolated immediately after their return,
separate and apart from other birds. This isolation
should be maintained indefinitely, if possible or at
least until it has been established that the birds are
not carriers of disease-producing agents, as may be
determined by exposure of a few susceptible birds
to direct contact with them.

6. It is suggested that the birds entered, or the entire
flock from which they come, be immunized against
those diseases for which approved vaccines and
methods are available.

7. No exhibitor may show more than 12 varieties,
48 birds per family. Entries will be received until
such time as the cooping capacity is reached.

8. Management reserves the right to reduce the
number of entries from one party, if the cooping
facilities are exhausted.

9. The American Standard of Perfection will
govern poultry judging with the limitations as set
forth in the General Rules and Rules of this

10. Entered specimens must be bonefide property of

Showmanship and Fitting

Exhibitors may show an animal in the fitting and showing contest provided it has been carried as a project and is owned by the exhibitor.

Fitting Competition Details:

Members must enter an animal ready to be fit. All animals need bathed and clipped prior to entering the ring. Absolutely no fitting may be completed prior to the Fitting Competition. Members will be divided into three categories: senior (ages 15-18), intermediate (ages 12-14), and junior (ages 8-11). Seniors will have 35 minutes to fit from the front shoulders of the animal and back including the tail. Intermediates will have 25 minutes to fit the back hips, legs, and tail. Juniors will have 15 minutes to fit the tail head and the tail. SECTION 3 AFGHANS AND QUILTS

QUILTING TERMINOLOGY

1. QUILT – an item that is constructed of two layers of cloth, with a filler in between, that is held together by hand or machine quilting.
2. PIECED QUILT – the quilt top is constructed of patches, units, blocks, or other elements joined with seams to make a design.
3. APPLIQUE – pieces of fabric are sewn by hand or machine onto a background fabric.
4. NOVELTY QUILT – a quilt top that is tied or tufted or tacked and uses an assembly or surface treatment that is less traditional. Examples in this category are yo-yo, cathedral window, tied, crazy, biscuit, photo memories, rag quilts, etc.
5. MIXED TECHNIQUE – two or more techniques are combined. Examples are pieced and appliquéd, or hand embroidered, or machine embroidered, or heirloom, or trapunto, or stencil, etc. Whole cloth quilts are also included in this category.
6. PIECER – this is the person that makes the quilt top.
7. ORIGINAL DESIGN – the piecer created the design without following or adapting another person's pattern.
8. Quilts are judged for the technique in which they are entered.

All contestants must pay regular gate admission.
An entry fee of \$10.00 will be paid for each tractor per class.

General:

1. All rules are subject to interpretation and/or change by the designated Pulling/Safety Committee consisting of at least 3 designees. Participants can be disqualified for being discourteous to others.
2. All entrants to participate at their own risk.
3. Open to all 2-wheel drive, rubber tired, stock, antique tractors that are gas, diesel, or propane powered and were manufactured in 1965 or prior.
4. All pulls will utilize a maximum of 3.5MPH ground speed.
5. All tractors must not exceed factory RPMs.
6. All tractors to be in stock condition as they came from the factory with no pulling enhancement modifications. Alternators, electronic distributors, hitch adjusters, and straight pipes are permitted.
7. Tractor owner provided reference documents must be published by the same manufacturer as tractor.
8. No shifting of gears or power shifts during the pull.
9. No racing fuel, aviation fuel, or octane boosters will be permitted.
10. The width of the entire machine must not exceed 8'6".
11. The minimum age of the driver is 16 yrs. with the Pulling/Safety Committee approval.
12. Suspected influence of drugs or alcohol will result in immediate disqualification.
13. Driver to remain seated during the pull. Any loss of parts during pull will result in disqualification.
14. Track officials may stop a pull at any time for safety reasons including a front end height that exceeds 16".

Inspection:

1. All tractors will be subject to inspection by the Pulling/Safety Committee at time of weigh in and as deemed necessary at any time during the contest. All decisions are final.

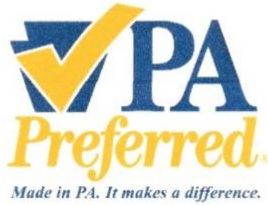

RULES:

1. Open to any individual **amateur** baker (ages 8 through 18 at the time of the fair's contest) who is a Pennsylvania resident. One entry per person.
2. **Entrants may NOT have won 1st place in this PA Preferred® Junior Baking contest at any other fair in 2023.**
3. Entry must be **six (6) individual sized portions** of the baked entry item (cookies, brownies or bars).
4. Entire entry must be **made from scratch**. No pre-packaged ingredients may be used (ex: *pre-made mixes, cookie dough, pie crust, frosting, etc.*). **All ingredients and decorations must be edible.**
5. At least two (2) PA Preferred® or locally purchased ingredients must be used in the recipe. Some examples of qualifying ingredients include grains (*such as oats or flour*), butter, milk, eggs, fruits and/or vegetables.

8. Recipe(s) must be submitted with the entry, printed on one side of 8-1/2" x 11" paper. Recipe must list all ingredients, quantities, and the preparation instructions. **The name of each PA Preferred® ingredient or locally purchased ingredient must be clearly listed clearly along with the source that made/grew the product** (ex: *PA Preferred Milk – Galliker's brand or Apples – Smith Farm Orchard*). Entrant's name, age, address and phone number must be printed on the back side of all the pages. (*All recipes and cookies-brownies-bars will become the property of the Fair or PA Farm Show and will not be returned.*)
9. Refrigeration is not available at the fair or PA Farm Show. Entries that require refrigeration after baking must indicate so in the recipe. Those entries will not be sold, auctioned or otherwise distributed for consumption after judging for food safety reasons.

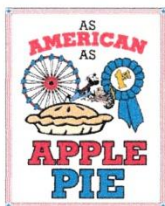

Each county/local fair is encouraged to conduct a 35th Annual Blue Ribbon Apple Pie Contest at their 2023 event. Listed below are the criteria which we would like each fair to use in their contest. The certified first place winner from each fair will then have the opportunity to enter an apple pie in the BLUE RIBBON APPLE PIE CONTEST at the 2024 PENNSYLVANIA FARM SHOW.

RULES for local Fair and the PA Farm Show contests are as follows:

1. Open to any individual **amateur** baker who is a Pennsylvania resident. One entry per person.
2. **Entrants may NOT have won 1st place in this Blue Ribbon Apple Pie contest at any other fair in 2023.**
3. Entire entry must be **made from scratch**. No pre-packaged ingredients may be used (*ex: pre-made mixes, cookie dough, pie crust, frosting, etc.*) **All ingredients and decorations must be edible.**
4. Recipe **must include at least 60% apples in the filling**. It does not need to be a "traditional" two crusted apple pie and it can have a variety of fillings.
5. The entire pie must be submitted for judging in a food safe disposable pie pan. (*All pans, plates and dishes are considered to be disposable and will not be returned.*)
6. The recipe for the pie and pie crust must be submitted with the entry. It should be submitted on one side of 8 1/2" by 11" paper. The recipe must list all the ingredients, quantities, and the preparation instructions. Entrant's name, address and phone number must be printed on the **back side** of all the pages. (*All recipes and pies will become the property of the Fair or PA Farm Show and will not be returned.*)
7. Refrigeration is not available at the Fair or PA Farm Show. Entries that require refrigeration after baking must indicate so in the recipe. Those entries will not be sold, auctioned or otherwise distributed for consumption after judging for food safety reasons.
8. Judging will be based on the following criteria:

Filling: consistency, doneness, moistness & flavor	25 points
Crust: color, flavor, texture doneness	20 points
Overall Appearance	15 points
Creativity	<u>10 points</u>

Creativity is essential to a varied competition. Do not limit your contest to a "traditional" two-crust apple pie. We are looking for a variety of fillings in the pies; the pie must include at least 60% apples in the filling.

The recipe for the pie and pie crust will also need to be submitted when entering at the Pennsylvania Farm Show.

Each Fair must submit the Contest Summary Report verifying the winning apple pie baker. This person will then be eligible to enter the state competition at the 2024 PA Farm Show and will receive the Official Certification Form from the PA Fairs Special Baking Contest Committee.
